Music 101 surveys the history, structure, and style of music, beginning with the development of classical music in Europe and leading up to the present day. It is designed to enhance students' appreciation and understanding of music by

focusing on historically important composers, performers, and pieces of music. Lectures highlight the history, characteristics, and performance practices of many genres of music.

- 1. Understand essential music terminology.
- 2.Recognize the attributes of various genres of music.
- 3. Identify important composers and compositions by name through listening.
- 4. Summarize the important developments in music history.
- 5. Compare and contrast art music, world music and popular music.
- 6.Distinguish the instrumental timbres of common ensembles.

Quizzes and exams will be based on readings, class lectures and presentations, and will include written and listening components. For listening components, you will aurally identify and/or respond via multiple choice and short answer to musical compositions played in class. Written portions will consist of multiple choice and/or short-answer questions.

<u>Performance Observation Assignment:</u> You will attend a classical music performance of your choice and will write a 2-page observation applying concepts and vocabulary learned during the course. A handout with more specific information on the assignment will be distributed in class. Observations may be handed in any time before the last day of instruction (Monday, May 4, 2014), but you should write and submit your observation within one week of attending the chosen performance. Performances must be approved by Professor Kernohan.
